Fr. Lance's Letter

Last Sunday afternoon, about 27 people attended the Open Forum. We began with a brief prayer service and followed it with allowing people to share their thoughts about the recent

scandals and crimes in the Church. People felt comfortable sharing their views and feelings, voicing their concerns and opinions, asking for greater participation and involvement of the laity, and wanting transparency and better communication.

This meeting was not only about our outrage and anger, especially regarding the cover-ups, but also to see what we at St. Virgil could do to be faithful to Christ and the Catholic Church. The gathering was briefed as to how we are in compliance with the "Dallas Charter": background checks, Virtus Training and Code of Conduct for all staff members and volunteers. It is important to know that every person in our parish dealing with our children must fulfill the requirements mentioned in the "Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People" adopted in 2002.

Some of the issues raised were: Why wasn't our Bishop present at this meeting? (Obviously, I did not invite him). This would be a great opportunity to look at the possibility of ordaining women and married men. (The scandals were perpetrated by mainly homosexual clergy). A Code of Conduct and Transparency requirements for Bishops. (I believe our USA Bishops are meeting in November to formulate such a Code). Other issues mentioned were vetting of seminarians, Cardinal McCarrick, writing letters to Bishops of the United States, and how these scandals are affecting Catholics and how many are staying away from the church.

A good outcome is that a few participants at this meeting will help draft a letter to our Bishop and to the USA gathering of Bishops (USCCB) requesting more involvement of the laity.

It was mentioned that a response to these scandals by the laity could be done in two ways: using your "feet" (stay away from the Catholic Church), and by using your "wallet" (not donating to the church collections). My personal comeback to this: Let us together "de-feat" these scandalous behaviors by our personal holiness, stronger participation in the sacraments and prayer life, an eager study of Sacred Scripture and our Faith, and compassionate activity toward the poor and needy. Become more like Christ, embody Christ, live like Christ. Thus, we can challenge this negativity by our love for God and our neighbor.

The offerings we give come from the "sweat of our brow and the work of our hands". Our Church must show greater accountability in all that we receive and all that we possess. May this time of crisis bring us together to find better ways of governing our Church, challenge us to live up to the high standards expected of us, and make us a Church where "sin" has no place, zero tolerance.

A huge Thank You to all who came to this meeting and hope this is the beginning of our openness to listen, to learn and to change for the best. May God bless us all - *Fr. Lance*



Weekly Reflections

Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time Mark 10:2-16

In this Gospel passage, Mark reveals Christ's preaching on the sanctity of marriage as well as the importance of children and their innocence in our lives, some of the keys to gaining the kingdom of God.

The Pharisees had been showing up continuously to test Christ, and on this occasion, they sought to corner Christ as one contradicting Moses on the issue of marriage and divorce. They asked Him whether it was "lawful for a husband to divorce his wife," as Moses had taught. Christ responded with a question, asking them what Moses had "commanded." They did not answer what Moses had "commanded," but rather what Moses had "permitted," *i.e.* that a husband could "write a bill of divorce and dismiss her." Christ had no trouble fielding this taunt, responding by reverting to the creation account and telling them that God made male and female, and "for this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh;" and that "what God has joined together, no human being must separate." The Pharisees left the confrontation empty-handed, failing to paint Christ as not living by the code of Moses.

By this Gospel, Mark demonstrated the connection between the Old Testament and the New Testament, how the New Testament's teachings fulfill the teachings in the Old Testament and make them even better. Clearly, Christ was not teaching laws for the sake of laws, but truth, for truth's sake. His teaching was, and still is, one based on love. Christ's words on marriage are truly poetic, and to our present day we are having relevant discussions on the essence of marriage and divorce and their effects on our lives. Although Mark writes that Christ had later told his disciples that a married man and woman who divorce and remarry commit adultery, there is no passage where Christ put anyone down for divorcing or cast out anyone for being unable to live out the marriage vows. We also find in another teaching moment among the gospels the story of Christ having encountered a woman charged with adultery, whom He saved from death by the accusing male crowd. In another incident in the gospels we find the story of how Christ met a woman at a well. She had been married many times but there is no account that he berated her; and we are told she became one of His earliest followers, Christ having shown her respect and mercy.

In his teachings, Christ sanctified marriage, an institution which has existed from the beginning of creation, and has emphasized the importance of children, the fruits of marriage, in the eyes of God. Indeed, Christ's first and one of His best-known miracles in the gospels was one performed at a wedding in Cana. Just by Christ's very presence at Cana Christ sanctified marriage and showed God's concern for our happiness in this world.

As to the importance of children, Mark revealed in his closing verse of this Gospel that Christ alluded to children as an example of how we should envision the kingdom of God. Christ stated that the kingdom belongs to "such as" the children, and that we should accept the kingdom of God like a child, lest we not enter it. Thus, by His words and action Christ has elevated marriage and has taught us to love and cherish the children, learning from their innocence and simplicity. For, through marriage we support, love and respect one another - husband, wife and children, should we be so blessed. Let us rely on God to help us to faithfully live out

these gifts of marriage and children as means of reaching the kingdom of God.

Lord, bless our families and help us to grow in our love for each other!

EVANGELIZATION CORNER

Faith is often described as a) believing in things that cannot be seen, b) believing in something in spite of the evidence or c) believing in something when there is no evidence to support the belief in the first place. This is not the Catholic definition of faith. While it is true that God is a Spirit and cannot be seen, it is not true that there is no evidence to support the existence of the unseen God. There is also sufficient evidence

THERE EITHER IS A GOD, OR THERE IS NOT. JESUS IS THAT GOD, OR HE IS NOT. SALVATION COMES THROUGH CHRIST ALONE, OR IT DOES NOT. This is a decision that every Christian must make!

The Intellectual Approach to evangelization is an evidencebased evangelization; a logical discussion of the existence of God and the death and resurrection of Jesus.

First there are a wide range of arguments for God's existence. The simplest of which is based on the Law of Causality. This argument is based on the following premises:

a. Whatever begins to exist has a cause;

to support the resurrection of Jesus.

- b. The universe just began to exist; and
- c. Therefore, if both of these are true the universe has a cause and that cause id God.

For this argument to be a good argument both premises must be true.

To deny the first premise is to say that the whole universe just appeared at some moment in the finite past for no reason. However, if it's really possible for things to pop into being without a cause, why did this spontaneous coming-into-being-fromnothing event only happen once several billions years ago and why don't we see this happening more often?

Further, there is ample scientific evidence that the universe is expanding. Scientific thinking has concluded that if the universe is expanding then it had an absolute beginning. Why? Because if the universe is getting bigger and bigger as it gets older and older, then it must have been smaller in the past. Since there was a beginning to the universe there had to be a spaceless, timeless, immaterial, powerful, uncaused, supernatural, creator that caused it to be; this sounds a lot like God.

With respect to the existence and the resurrection of Jesus, historians such as W.L. Craig, J.P. Moreland, G. Habermas, and others have done an especially good job of detailing historical evidence indicating that Jesus of Nazareth existed, died on the cross and rose from the dead.

In conclusion, Christian faith is more than a faith of blind trust. It is a rational examination and evaluation of real evidence, forming a conclusion and sharing that conclusion with the world around us.

May His grace be with each of us as we continue on our journey with Jesus.
