**Fr. Lance's Letter**

Advent is here again! This is a renewed opportunity to meet the requirements of preparing for the Gift of God Himself in allowing Jesus to be born in us. Consider becoming a little more scriptural: live in Nazareth. This village at the time of Mary and Joseph was almost unknown, fairly unpopular ("nothing good ever comes from Nazareth"), poverty and lack of basic amenities were the hallmark of Nazareth. Yet, people lived in Nazareth. They eked out a living, many working in the nearby Roman Garrison Settlement of Sepphoris, some 4 miles north-west of Nazareth.

This insignificant village was visited by the Angel Gabriel, sent by God to tell Mary that God favored her. She was to be the mother of His son, Jesus. This is the focal point of Advent: The Coming of Jesus into our lives. We are asked to make space in the center of our lives, because God wants to be born anew in us.

It is easier for parents to recall how excited, apprehensive, joy-filled, anxious, hopeful and planning they were. In spite of the pressure of work and other duties, they were able to find time to clear up time and space for the birth of their new child. Space for the new baby at home had to be planned for; time scheduled for visits to the doctor; diet restrictions and many other odds and ends.

Advent requires us to make space and time for the Coming of

Jesus. Interior silence is not optional; emptying oneself for God is essential. Clearing up space, de-cluttering, decorating, are part of the Advent scenarios. Make space for God: prayer, Eucharist, Reconciliation, visiting the Blessed Sacrament in church, reading scripture and books of our faith, letting Advent music lead us gently into the spirit of holy expectation, control food and drink intake (fasting).

Through your generous donations the collection for the weekend of November 24/25 was \$9,708 (In-pew donations \$7,764 and \$1,944 through Faith Direct. The Thanksgiving collection was \$1,380. Your generosity will allow us to continue to provide for the services, ministries and outreaches that our parish supports.

What you do during Advent may seem burdensome or bothersome. However, God sends His Angel to us during Advent. God finds us very favorable to be born in us. So walk with Mary this Advent Season and make a time of Grace, Beauty, Hope and Joy.





## Ministries & Outreaches

### Star of Bethlehem

It has been a tradition in our parish to begin our Christmas Outreach Program following the Thanksgiving holiday. For more than thirty years, St. Virgil's parishioners have shown their compassion for the poor by responding generously to the Star of Bethlehem trees.

Two trees with gift card requests are in our church the weekends of December 1/2 and December 8/9. Anyone wishing to contribute to this outreach program can select an envelope from one of the trees on either side of the altar and purchase the fit card requested.

Please place the envelope with the enclosed gift card in one of the collection boxes under the trees. Please mark the amount on the fit card.

The gift cards are distributed to local charities which provide emergency shelter, food, clothing, and medicinal needs to families in desperate need. When Christmas comes, and children are told "things are scarce this year," our gift cards come to the rescue. To think that it is our gift cards that come to the rescue help us to understand the true meaning of Christmas.

Gift cards will be sold at the main parking lot entrance after each Mass and during the week during regular Parish Office hours.

### Jersey Battered Women's Service Holiday Boutique

Every December, the Rosary Society sponsors a gift collection for the holiday boutique conducted by the Jersey Battered Women's Service (JBWS) for its clients. Last year over 200 families, including 445 children, received holiday gifts. Mothers select gifts of new toys and clothing donated by the local community. Handmade gifts are especially appreciated. You can imagine a mother's relief as she knows that she can give her children some joy in the holiday season.

JBWS has requested that we consider gifts for teens and pre-teens although items for all ages are welcome. Suggested items are listed here, but a more-detailed list is available in the Parish Office:

- Clothing for all ages (especially boots for ages 12 months-4 years)
- Jewelry/wallets/purses/watches
- Makeup/nail polish
- Puzzles/books (no board games, please)
- Crafts/science kits
- Models (Lego, Minecraft, Matchbox, etc.)
- Sports equipment

Please drop off your gifts (new and unwrapped) at the Parish Office **no later than Tuesday, December 4**. Unused wrapping paper (sheets, rolls), ribbons and bows may be given separately. Rosary Society members may bring their gifts to the monthly meeting, also December 4.

All parishioners of St. Virgil's are invited to participate and to make the holidays a bit brighter for these families.

## OPERATION CHILLOUT OUTREACH

Operation Chillout is a local grassroots program which started out primarily assisting homeless Vietnam vets. Today, most are veterans of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. These vets are young – 20 to 30 years old – and many are women. They risk staying homeless and unemployed as many suffer from post-traumatic stress and other health conditions that increase their risk of death. Many choose to live outdoors rather than stay overnight in shelters. It is to this group that Operation Chillout ([www.operationchillout.org](http://www.operationchillout.org)), now in its 18<sup>th</sup> year, provides the basic necessities to help them through the winter and summer months.

Starting in early December, Operation Chillout volunteers will distribute backpacks filled with warm clothing and toiletries to over 1,000 homeless right here in Morris and neighboring counties and eastern Pennsylvania.

St. Virgil Parish is a collection partner. We have been asked to provide only the items listed below for both men and women. ***Clothing must be new; please provide only the items and sizes requested.*** We will have this collection from **November 17 - December 2**. Please place your gift in the carton beside the altar. (\*most-needed items)

- Thermal underwear (L, XL, 2XL) \*
- Warm gloves (no leather, Gore-Tex preferred) \*
- Heavy, warm socks (wool/acrylic blend preferred)
- Zipped hooded sweatshirt or heavy flannel shirt
- Knit cap

If you prefer, cash or checks payable to either St. Virgil Church or Operation Chillout Inc. may be given instead of clothing. Please place your donation in an envelope and drop it into the collection basket. The organization does not solicit, so you will not be contacted for additional support. Operation Chillout, Inc. is a registered 501(c)(3) not for profit organization and is eligible for matching gifts and grants. Your contributions are tax deductible. Cash and checks payable to St. Virgil's will be used to purchase gloves and thermal underwear.

As we prepare to celebrate the Christmas season with friends and family, please think of those who have little to be thankful for and be as generous as you can. Your generosity will be very much appreciated.

## Weekly Reflections

### ***First Sunday of Advent Luke 21:25-28, 34-35***

Today we begin the new Church Liturgical Year. Luke, the author of the Gospel of Compassion, starts this year off with serious reflection "...nations will be in dismay. People will die of fright..." But again, Luke reminds us that we are not alone when these events occur. "Then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory..." We must be ready, "stand erect because our redemption is at hand." We are told by Luke not to be overcome by the anxieties of daily life "... be vigilant...and pray you have the strength to stand before the Son of Man."

The Old Testament reading today is from Jeremiah 33:14-16. It starts out sounding very much like Luke. "The days are coming... when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah...In those days, Judah shall be safe...and Judah shall dwell secure; this is what they shall call her: 'The Lord our Justice.'" God is telling us that things will look bad, but He will be there to get us through. This sounds not like a promise for eternity, but like God's daily promise of help.

Each reading is focusing on the future. Advent also focuses on our future. We are waiting, but for what? The arrival of an Infant Savior, or an eternal resting place? Since the New Testament fulfills the Old, it is ever so exciting that we are being told that this coming, this birth of a very important Child, is not the end story. Nor is the Resurrection of Christ the end game, or our death. For at the resurrection of all of us, we shall meet the Lord of Justice. This is what we are awaiting - the coming, the Advent of His joining us in our journey to Him.

Luke is telling us that Christ was promising to be here with us, from the beginning to the end. He fulfilled His promise with the Incarnation; and we wait every day to find Him in our lives. We wait for Him to come in the eternity He promised.

In this conflicted world of ours, let us set aside our problems and quietly prepare for His coming today, tomorrow and for eternity.

***Oh come, Oh come, Emmanuel, we are waiting.***

### EVANGELIZATION CORNER



For many people in our Western secular world, the Christmas season starts right after Thanksgiving Day and ends with the opening of gifts on Christmas Day.

In spite of all the Christmas carols and hymns we hear during the entire month of December and all the holiday festivities that surround this

time of the year, Christmas actually occurs on Christmas Eve with the birth of Christ and continues until January 5.

For us Catholics, however, the time between Thanksgiving and Christmas, "the Christmas season", is actually the Advent season. Unfortunately, Advent often gets lost in the hustle and bustle of shopping, baking, office parties not to mention planning and traveling. Aside from a few novelty Advent calendars, most non-Christians are not exposed to the reality or the meaning of Advent. If they are, it doesn't seem to go much deeper than a "countdown to Christmas".

So slow down for just a few minutes, take a deep breath and reflect on the real meaning of the season. Advent is both the end of the old and the beginning of a new church year. It is a time when we begin looking to the future while looking to the past; looking with anticipation to both the birth of Jesus and the day when the risen Jesus will come again. It is the season for preparing for the coming of Jesus Christ in our midst.

Our Catholic faith has always been about the past, present, and future! And, Advent is a mysterious time of the year. In spite of what we may say, most of us don't want our faith to be nice, simple, and easy to figure out. We love mystery, hope, expectation, and drama. We should embrace this Advent season rather than rushing through it. This season, with its sense of mystery, can be used as a tool to speak to family and friends. It provides a perfect window for outreach that's substantially bigger than the usual Christmas evangelism window. It provides a window of opportunity for reaching out to new people and sharing the message of Christ's love with people who don't worship and love Him.

Some ideas for sharing the Good News of Jesus during this season include:

- Taking a neighbor to St. Virgil's "Holiday Sing-Along".
